Look for Madonna with the Long Neck. It is officially called "Madonna and Child with Angels and St Jerome". But you can guess how the name came about.

Acropolis, Greece

Look for The Gneiss. A slab of beautiful patterned rock (in the Geology, Gems and Minerals: Hope Diamond, section 1) originally formed 9 miles beneath what is now Sri Lanka. Gneiss is uses for counter tops and to face buildings.

The Pyramids, Egypt

Instead of a modest headstone or plaque when they died The Egyptian Pharaohs preferred Pyramids, several hundred feet tall.

Look for The Great Pyramid of Keops. At 481 ft it was the tallest building in the world until Lincoln Cathedral overtook it in 1311.

It is thought the pyramid shape was chosen because it mimics the angle of the sun's rays through clouds (the Pharaohs wanted to join the sun god after death).



Machu Picchu, Peru

The site was a royal estate for the Emperor Pachacuti, built in the 15th-century by The Inca atop an 8000ft mountain.

Look for The Overlook, which relates that Machu Picchu was so well constructed it has survived earthquakes which destroyed buildings in the nearby city of Cusco.

Its lawns are kept neatly trimmed by llamas and alpacas.

Notes from the Countryside

Wildlife report

Our Blue Tit has started to build a nest in our observation box, it is really interesting to see her nip in and out. She has finished bringing bits of grass and is now bringing in feathers that she collects in the garden. There seem to be more early butterflies on the wing this year. We have spotted Tortoiseshell, Peacock, Brimstone, Comma, Orange Tip and large White. Our Swallows are not back yet, last year they came back on the 24th April, so a day or two to go yet as I write on the 9th.

Farming report

We have finished Spring drilling and the early sown crops are starting to emerge. After what I wrote last Month, I am sure that you will be amused to know that we now badly need a good shower of rain. We have one or two patches where the Winter sown crops have completely failed and theses we have re-drilled with Spring Oats. Our fields of Winter beans are looking quite good and it is good to hear that they are likely to be wanted. There is a demand for top quality beans from Egypt for human consumption and the rest will be in demand for animal feed. We are up to date with our fertilizer and spraying programme.

The last of the cows has now calved and the next thing they are looking forward to is being turned out to grass. This always causes wild excitement as the old mums skip and kick their heels in the air in a most un-ladylike fashion! The calves are all looking fit and well and are strong enough to take the flush of milk that spring grass will produce from the cows.

My new hens are doing very well. You may remember that our bull escaped and knocked down my hen run, inevitably this meant that the fox got hold of them. The poor things were getting to the end of their lives in any case, but it was sad to see them go. I now have a new hen run and managed to buy 5 point of lay pullets. It took them about 4 weeks to settle in and now they are laying 9 or 10 eggs a day. The modern hybrid hen is a remarkably reliable egg layer and very calm as well. During the War, my Father tried keeping White Leghorn hens, they were good layers, but also very

flighty and it only took a low flying aircraft to upset them and put them off laying for weeks.

Garden report

At last I have been able to get onto my Vegetable garden. The unceasing rain during the Winter Months and very little frost had meant that I had been unable to do any digging. Now the dry weather has come and the beds are like concrete on top, the Winter rains having put the surface down solid. I have been forking over the beds, but this has resulted in large clods of earth that take a lot of breaking down to a seed bed. I find that a 2 hour soak from a sprinkler, and then leaving for 24 hours helps to break down the clods. I leave one bed un-dug for the growing of Cabbages etc. as they prefer solid land. All my potatoes are in the ground and I have sown Lettuces, Carrots, beetroot and leeks outside and sweetcorn in the greenhouse.

To share the honours and beat the foe.

The ladies fair are doing their bit Misses Jebb, Gardiner, Thody, Brett; Four bright Starrs all do shine Canteen workers doing fine.

Two dear boys their life has gone
And another a prisoner with the Hun;
They represent the Services all –
It hurt, but proudly they answered the call.

All went without a squirm or pain; Let's hope they'll soon be home again To join in all the fun and glee, When every country shall be free.

Our Home Guards too are up-to-date, Always on duty – never late; Special police their job they do, Patrolling all the village through.

Then there is our factory here,
Where girls are working with good cheer
Making lights that shine so merrily
That we should not in darkness be.

When headed by our Canon Jebb Our fire guards never lose their head; With stirrup pump, water, and sand, At duty's call the take their stand.











LOCAL WAR MEMORIES AUGUST 1944

This is an account of the war memories of Denis Gray, the brother of the late Pamela Baltruschat whom most villagers will remember as she was a regular contributor to Graveley Matters for many years.

Denis was 10 years old in August 1944 and lived with his family at the 'Nook' (now called Crow End), Rectory End, Graveley. His father, Jesse, was the local ARP warden and Denis was one of five children. Denis and his brother Derrick worked for T.W.Franklin of Graveley Hall Farm next to the church and the church clock was the time piece for everything that happened on the farm. Denis started work at six years old helping with the harvest.

In August 1944 Denis was helping with the harvest together with his brother and the full time staff of men too old for the services. The church clock struck 7 but it was too damp to start harvesting so they all sat outside the cart shed and had a snack. Denis had two hunks of bread and bottled cold tea wrapped in a sock. As they sat eating they heard planes approaching. The noise became very loud and the slates on the farm building shook and the ground vibrated. The horses in the yard were very frightened but they were tied down so they couldn't bolt.

Denis and Derrick stood on the yard wall looking towards Weston. There were many planes flying in formation. A twin engine P38 Lightning was flying at twice the speed of the bombers, weaving and turning in a clockwise direction then catching up with the lead bombers again. The P38 turned again and collided with a bomber and took the left hand wing and one engine off. The bomber then looped wing over wing in a downward spiral between the oncoming formation. It was sometime before it collided with a bomber on the lower level. Debris was falling from the impact. As for the P38 again debris was falling in a stream from this. The impact action catapulted down but not over Weston but more in a southward direction. Parachutes were coming from one plane.

The boys and men then continued bringing in the harvest until midday. It was a Saturday and work then finished for the week and so they were then able to run towards Weston to see what had happened. They found wreckage scattered over a large area and American personnel were on site. The Americans told the boys that sadly the airmen in the planes had not survived.

- The BROWN FOOD CADDY bin is collected each week.
- Please dispose of old batteries in specialist bins located at shops and supermarkets or you can place them in a bag on top
 of the recycling bin.
- Textiles, such as old clothes, paired shoes, towels and bed linen will be collected if placed in a carrier bag next to your recycling on collection day
- Extra recycling: You may place additional recycling out for collection next to your grey bin in a recyclable cardboard box or reusable plastic storage box.
